

Hiroshima National Peace Memorial Hall for the Atomic Bomb Victims was established by the Japanese government in August, 2002 to remember and mourn the sacred sacrifice of the atomatic bomb victims. It is also an expression of Japan's desire for genuine and lasting peace.

This Hall is designed to convey the truth of the tragedy to people around the world and ensure that future generations will learn from the experience.

To mourn for the dead who sought water, a fountain was set up around the monument indicating the time the atomic bomb was dropped; roof tiles burned in the explosion were unearthed during construction work and are now on display.



Upper Level

Special exhibitions are held on a regular basis. Visitors can read personal accounts of the atomic bombing.

Commentary Device

Visitors can read notes about the experience on the screen in four different languages.

An exhibition displays personal accounts of the atomic bombing in line with a specific theme. Mementos related to personal accounts of the experience are also exhibited.







Materials are available in **Japanese**, **English**, **Chinese**, **and Korean**, and some personal accounts have been translated into other languages. Visitors are also welcome to access materials stored at Nagasaki National Peace Memorial Hall for the Atomic Bomb Victims.

Visitors can search, read, and watch personal accounts of the atomic bombing, testimonial videos (about 20 min.), and videos of materials in storage by using the touch panel.

Slope to the Hall of Remembrance

By going down the slope in a counter-clockwise direction, visitors go back in time to that moment.

This is a place to guietly mourn the atomic bomb victims and think about peace. The bombed cityscape seen from the proximity of the hypocenter is reflected on the wall surface with about 140,000 tiles, the number of atomic bomb victims.* The names of the districts of the Hiroshima City area at the time of the bombing are displayed below. *The number of victims as of December 1945

2Victim Information Area



Photos of the atomic bomb victims and a list of their names are displayed to convey the fact that so many people died from the atomic bomb.

Portraits and the names of the deceased donated by the bereaved are projected one by one.

Visitors can search for individual victims by name.

Public Readings of Personal Accounts of the Atomic Bombing [Free]



■Transportation


From JR Hiroshima Station (South Exit) It takes about 5 minutes after cetting off the bus or streetcar

Bus...Take the Hiroshima Bus (red bus) bound for Yoshijima and get off at Hondori (About 20 min.) Streetcar...Take the streetcar bound for Hiroshima Port (Ujina) passing through Kamiya-cho and get off at Hondori (About 20 min.)

Take the streetcar bound for Miyajima-guchi or Eba and get off at Genbaku Dome-mae (About 20 min.)
